



## NACTA Journal Update

Over the past two years and four months the NACTA Journal received 129 submissions in 2 years and 4 months which is an average of 4.4 submissions per month, or 54 submissions per year. Manuscripts average 36.8 days in the review process.

During 2007, 44 manuscripts were submitted to the NACTA FastTrack website. Fifteen manuscripts were rejected giving a 34% rejection rate or a 66% acceptance rate for the NACTA Journal. By comparison, in 2006, 41 manuscripts were submitted to the NACTA Journal. Of these 11 were rejected, giving an acceptance rate of 73%. Each issue of the Journal publishes up to 10 manuscripts, a reprint from a past Journal, NACTA on Campus, Teaching Tips/Notes, NACTA Yesterday (feature from the Historian), book reviews, position announcements (if paid), Join NACTA, and NACTA Teaching Awards. Currently, once a manuscript is accepted it is printed in the next issue of the Journal – no backlog.

For the 2008 NACTA/SERD Conference the Editor received and oversaw the review of 140 abstracts (up from 125 in 2006), most of which were submitted by the March 1. Abstracts were electronically submitted to a website provided by PAQ Interactive where they were assigned to reviewers. After the review, local conference committee determined the abstracts that would be accepted as oral presentation. The other accepted abstracts were assigned to poster presentation. The new abstract guidelines developed by the ad hoc committee were very helpful. Submitting the abstracts on line to a website service created a few procedural glitches that need to be worked out next year. Abstracts are published in the June NACTA Journal and in a booklet for the conference.

The first electronic issue of the NACTA Journal using FastPress will be the March 2009 issue. For the time being both the print and hard copy of the Journal will be published but we plan to move to fully electronic quarterly issues with one annual hard copy of all four issues. The NACTA E-newsletter continues to be created and emailed on a monthly basis with the exception of the summer months. PDFs of the newsletter are also posted on the NACTA website.
