






Craig Mathews holds a BS with honors from the other MSU, Michigan State University. He went for post grad study there in education and criminal justice while working in law enforcement. He and his wife Jackie came to West Yellowstone in 1979. Craig was the Town's Police Chief. In 1981 they founded Blue Ribbon Flies and continue to operate this fly shop. Craig and Jackie have won numerous conservation awards for their environmental work such as The Protector of Yellowstone National Park Award" presented by Yellowstone National Park, both The Nature Conservancy and Greater Yellowstone Coalition's coveted conservation business of the year awards, and many more. Craig was Fly Rod and Reels

"2005 World Angler of the Year" and Trout Unlimited's "Stream Champion" in 2011. Craig has authored and co-authored 9 important books on fishing. His latest, "Simple Fly-Fishing with Tenkara," was released in April 2014 and co-authored with Patagonia Inc. founder Yvon Chouinard. Craig co-founded 1% for the Planet an alliance of businesses donating 1 percent of their gross sales to researched and approved conservation causes. To date, 1% for the Planet has donated over \$115 million to conservation and environmental programs. Craig and Jackie also manage the Sun Ranch, a 28,000 acre ranch in the Madison Valley of Montana south of Ennis. The ranch's cattle program is used to enhance wildlife habitat as well as provide sustainable ranching, and more.

Ron Hanson is the Neal E. Harlan Professor of Agribusiness in the Department of Agricultural Economics at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He has earned 13 national and regional teaching awards in addition to 16 university and college level recognitions during his 40 year teaching career. Ron has achieved both the Outstanding Senior Teaching Awards in his discipline from the Agricultural and Applied Economics Association and the Western Agricultural Economics Association. He is a member of the University of Nebraska Academy of Distinguished Teaching Scholars and is the only person to twice receive the Holling Senior Faculty Award for Teaching Excellence for his College. Ron has been recognized several times by NACTA with the following awards: Teaching Award of Merit; Teacher Fellow Award; Central Region Outstanding Teaching Award; John Deere Teaching Award of Excellence; and the Murray Brown Leadership Award.

Last year Ron was honored with the 2013 NACTA Distinguished Educator's Award. He has earned the National USDA Excellence in Teaching Award in Agricultural and Food Sciences and was honored by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Higher Education with the Nebraska Professor of the Year Award. He was voted by the University of Nebraska students as the Educator of the Year and is the only faculty member to have earned 22 recognitions from the University Parents Association for his contributions to students. His service to rural youth and farm families has been recognized by the Nebraska Bankers Association, the Nebraska State Department of Agriculture, and the National FFA Foundation. Ron holds a NACTA life membership. He is a past Central Regional Director, Vice President, and President for NACTA. Ron currently serves as Director of Membership. He is a member of the Executive Committee and the Teaching Award Recognition Committee for NACTA. Professor Hanson earned his B.S. degree from Western Illinois University and then received his Masters and Doctorate degrees from the University of Illinois. Before joining the University of Nebraska faculty in 1974, he was Assistant Professor in agricultural industries at Southern Illinois University. Ron and his wife Marilyn have two children and four grandchildren.

Are fieldtrips worth it? Strand Union Alumni Lounge

If fieldtrips lead to improved student learning outcomes (SLO), the question could boil down to a benefit-cost analysis, because those fieldtrips—despite their improved SLO—incur costs, from gas to rental vehicles to liability.

If field trips do not lead to improved SLO, why not? Is it because we lack the assessment instruments? If we lack the assessment instruments, when are we going to have them? If we have assessment instruments that can help measure gains in knowledge, skills, attitudes, then how come fieldtrips are not moving one or all those needles?
