- Facebook utilized to develop the learning community



Literature Review

- Teaching and learning occurs in a social context (Maor, 2003)
- Developing a 'community' within a classroom allows for more student collaboration (O'Connor, 1998)
- Facebook has been shown to be a promising tool for to establish online learning communities (Whittacker, Howarth & Lynn, 2014)
- Benefits include affective communication, social support and increased problem solving strategies (Mazer, Murphy & Simonds, 2007)
- Students are very interested in using Facebook for educational purposes (Roblyer, McDaniel, Webb, Herman & Witty, 2010)

Why did we use it?

- Ease- Universal compatibility
- Accessibility- 1.86 billion users world wide
- Cost- Free!
- Notifications- Alerts of posting and other activity
- Need in the class- classes only meet once a week, no time for development of a community within constraints of regular class time
- Monitoring the activities of hundreds of livestock and dozens of students

How was it used?

- Student's major semester long project- barn check duty
- Students added to the online learning community at beginning of the semester
- Update page every four hours with pictures and narratives of their checks, bottle feedings, and skills used
- Instructors, campus veterinarian, livestock faculty serve as administrators of the group (get notifications)

How was it used?

- Assessment tool- checks were a major part of students' participation grade
 - Appropriate techniques were monitored
- Communication tool
 - Everyone involved with the livestock on campus would know what was happening (example- lambs born, kid with a runny nose, we needed clean towels etc).
 - Scheduling- students would use the online community to cover for each other, schedule postings
 - Promotion- courses, internships, campus events, jobs
- A tool for reflection




7am check - All of the animals appear to be good this morning. I got most of the lambs to nurse and I will work on the rest before I leave. No does or ewes are in labor right now.








